
We participate with the following organizations that are standing up against hate and bigotry and promoting inclusion.

This is an organization fighting for Justice in the court and prison systems as well as providing support to recently freed individuals and wrongly incarcerated individuals.

The project arranged prison visits (virtual during the pandemic) where insiders and outsiders share their humanity.

The program provides hope and encouragement to human beings who are often invisible in our society and helps them to feel visible, heard and valuable leading to a greater success rate upon release


- HCS volunteers were trained to help newly released inmates prepare resumés and practice interview techniques.

A nonprofit organization that provides humanitarian aid and assistance to refugees. It was originally established in 1881 to aid Jewish refugees. Since its inception, HIAS has helped resettle more than 4.5 million people from Africa, Latin America, Europe and the Middle East

Community Engagement

- HCS, in conjunction with the Westchester Jewish Coalition for Immigration, held a Refugee Shabbat. Iryna, a Ukrainian asylum seeker, mother of two young children visited and spoke about her journey from Ukraine to Poland and then to the United States with help from HIAS and WJCI.
